Thomas Gale Moore, Senior Fellow at the Hoover Institution specializes in international trade, regulation, the environment, and privatization. He has written on airline deregulation, trucking regulation and deregulation, stock market margins, minimum wages, energy policy, environmental policy and privatization. Recently, he has been researching the economic consequences of global warming, should it occur, and has written a book, which the Cato Institute published in 1998 on the subject, entitled: *Climate of Fear: Why We Shouldn't Worry about Global Warming*. He has written many essays on the subject of climate change and continues to research the topic.

He attended MIT, then enlisted in the U.S. Navy, where he served for four years during the Korean War. After his tour of duty, he earned his B.A. degree from George Washington University in 1957, and his M.A. and Ph.D. in economics from the University of Chicago in 1959 and 1961.

Dr. Moore was a member of President Ronald Reagan's Council on Economic Advisers from 1985 to 1989. In that capacity, he supervised a staff of economists who advised the President on trade, tax, regulation, agriculture, transportation, environment, and health issues. During 1968-70, he had served as Senior Staff Economist on the Council covering regulatory and industrial organization issues.
